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Unlocking Lessons

Lessons learned from a decade of capacitybuilding through a training of trainers programme on physical security and stockpile management

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Training Programme

Based on the UN Programme of Action and acknowledging physical security and stockpile management (PSSM) as a key element of weapons and ammunition management (WAM), the Multinational Small Arms and Ammunition Group (MSAG) initiated a training programme on the security and stockpile management of weapons, ammunition and explosives for East African states in Kenya in 2012. Participants to be trained are from among the military, police and wildlife service sectors.


To lessen dependency on foreign trainers and build on existing regional expertise in WAM, the MSAG trainers developed a training of trainers (ToT) process. The goal is to develop a sustainable pool of regional trainers who can themselves train future experts once the ToT process comes to an end.

"Our involvement does not end in the classroom. We are all ambassadors that continue working on the SALW control issue once we have completed the training."



Between 2012 and 03/2024, MSAG donor governments invested an estimated 1.5 million euros into this capacity-building endeavour. Up until March 2024, 469 participants were trained, out of whom 42 were certified as PSSM instructors and 13 as senior instructors. The following image shows their geographical distribution


Total number of participants

BUILDING TRUST AT DIFFERENT LEVELS IS ESSENTIAL FOR A SUCCESSFUL PROCESS AND OUTCOME.

Trust between partners and stakeholders, as well as with and between trainers and trainer candidates plays a key role in any capacity-building endeavour and takes time to grow. It is therefore important to ensure continuity in terms of personnel, as this contributes to the success of a process and facilitates trust and the creation of sustainable structures.

COMBINING PARTNERS WITH DIFFERENT SKILL SETS IS BENEFICIAL FOR A TRAINING PROCESS.

Stakeholders implementing the regional PSSM training are MSAG, RECSA (Regional Centre on Small Arms in the Great Lakes Region, the Horn of Africa and Bordering States), bicc and the International Peace Support Training School (IPSTC) in Nairobi/Kenya, where the training takes place.

bicc's long-term engagement in the East Africa ToT process has also led to the joint development of a new training module on "Cross-cutting issues with a special focus on the RECSA region", including a dedicated section on "WAM and Gender. Understanding the importance of including gender onsiderations into WAM". The gender component of the new training module aims to sensitise course participants to the importance of mainstreaming gender into a technical field such as PSSM and highlights its place within WAM. The new training module has been part of the official training module package since October 2023.

Each partner brings a unique skill set that complements that of the others. MSAG representatives come from the military and therefore naturally enjoy the credibility and respect of the course participants who come from arms-bearing services. MSAG representatives are, therefore, in the best position to provide initial training and now mentor the ToT process on such a technical subject matter such as SALW stockpile management. RECSA, an internationally recognised inter-governmental organisation within Africa whose mandate is to address the proliferation of illicit SALW to provide a conducive environment for sustainable development, enjoys the credibility of its member states, is familiar with their needs and is in an excellent position to ensure the most suitable participants for the training. bicc, a non-profit research institute, became involved in this process in 2016 where we seconded an adviser to RECSA who allowed for continuity despite personnel changes within the regional partner organisation and to act as a connecting point of contact between IPSTC, RECSA and MSAG. This proved crucial for the successful implementation of the training courses, especially in the first years. Since October 2018, a dedicated staff member based in Bonn has been supporting the training process, taking over from the seconded advisor whose assignment ended in January 2023.
